Markham Forklift License - In North America, getting forklift certification or a forklift license involves classroom and hands-on training. Regulatory control over certification, training and license for powered industrial truck operators falls under the jurisdiction of provincial, federal and state groups. Operators could get a license either by a third party or through training administered by the employer. In any case, regulatory requirements need to be met. Recertification is necessary every two to three years.

The lift truck is a powered industrial equipment which is designed along with many alternatives, like for example stand-up and sit down models, propane and electric versions, and various types and sizes to meet the industrial requirements of employees. Operator training programs are usually individualized to be able deal with the specific kinds and uses for which the operator is training. Training on a gas-powered, sit-down lift truck inside a warehouse setting will not be the same as training on a stand-up, propane-powered forklift within a shipyard. The different forklifts and their uses makes it impossible to establish universal licensing requirements for all equipment and industries. Regulatory standards, thus, have a tendency not to focus on specific course requirements but instead on the outcome of individual training programs.

Employer-provided, on-the-job training is the most common way for operators to be given their forklift certification or license. This method of certification needs the employer to provide practical training and classroom sessions on machines in the workplace. Employers could opt to train personnel on each type of forklift separately, or to train them on all machinery combined. The curriculum incorporates lift truck operation procedures, safety measures, company rules and forklift maintenance. Topics particular to the worksite, like for example hazardous conditions or materials, should be included. Following classroom learning, operators are taught how to safely utilize and operate each type of lift truck on the worksite.

When using a third party trainer, the certification process will usually consist of an on-site component with hands-on practice.

Typically, a certification provided by an employer would not transfer from the current employer to the next employer. Receiving a forklift license through employer-provided training enables the operator to run a lift truck for that particular employer only.

Forklift safety will always be an essential aspect of the lift truck license training, though the specifics of the safety training would be dependent upon the machinery being used. Certain safety problems will differ for every employer and industry. Both employer-provided training and third-party providers might have to deal with additional requirements for safety training in applicable businesses, like in marine and offshore operations.
